

2021 Spring Meeting Recap

On May 6 and 7, Kentucky archivists gathered to share "Status Updates" from each other during the KCA Spring Meeting. The theme allowed for a variety of presentations that provided us all with updates from fellow KCA members. Day one status updates saw presentations from Kyna Herzinger and Lauren Bickel (University of Louisville) on collaborating with the Frazier History Museum on a COVID-19 rapid-response collection and the methods and workflows involved, and from Devon Stivers and Derek Clark (Department for Libraries and Archives) on the negotiation for legacy gubernatorial records of former Governor Matthew Bevin and former Lieutenant Governor Jenean Hampton, as well as a brief overview of the workflows in managing the media collection.

During day two, Colleen Barrett (University of Kentucky) shared the King Library Press' transition from in-person to online

events and the lessons learned so far with their planning efforts. Anu Kasarabada and Jay-Marie Bravent (University of Kentucky) presented on their work using archival materials from the John G. Heyburn II Initiative for Excellence in the Federal Judiciary to allow instructors to adapt materials for their purposes.

During the Business Meeting, KCA welcomed new Board members: Ruth Bryan (University of Kentucky) as Vice Chair and Heidi Taylor-Caudill (John James Audubon State Park Museum) as Member-at-Large.


News from the Berea College Special Collections and Archives (SCA)

The Phil Primack Photographs and Papers collection (finding aid available at: (<u>https://</u><u>bereaarchives.libraryhost.com/repositories/2/resources/29</u>) is open to researchers. The collection (bulk dates 1964-2000; 5 boxes) consists of photographs, correspondence, writings, transcripts of interviews, and other papers of journalist Phil Primack.

During his career as a journalist Phil Primack covered public policy, politics, and the economy for numerous news outlets including *The New York Times*, the *Boston Globe, Commonwealth, Boston*, and *Columbia Journalism Review*. This collection contains numerous photographs, most of them taken while Primack worked as a reporter for *The Mountain Eagle* in Whitesburg, KY. In addition to documenting coal mining, the life and work of coal miners, the Finley Mine disaster at Hurricane Creek (December 1970), and the Buffalo Creek disaster (February 1972), Primack's photographs and papers document the landscapes, people, history, and culture of Appalachia.

Numerous materials within the collection were digitized as part of a Mellon Partners in Humanities Education Digital Project funded by the Mellon Foundation. Thanks to Tim O'Doherty (Berea College student and Mellon Partners in Humanities Education Digital Project Assistant) and Shay Steele (SCA volunteer) for digitizing the collection and providing additional finding guide work. Their work was completed during the summer of 2020 allowing SCA to continue collection development and processing during the Covid-19 pandemic. A Kentucky State University librarian was recently named as a writer and researcher for the Chronicle of African Americans in the Horse Industry.



Sharon McGee, librarian and archives records manager, joined the project recently. The Chronicle of African Americans in the Horse Industry is an online interactive archive to house and display photos, artifacts and oral histories of the African Americans who have worked and continue to work in equine industries.

The project is supported through an Art Meets Activism grant from the Kentucky Foundation for Women.

"Those of us working on the project are thankful to be able to use the Kentucky libraries and repositories that have resources and information on the horse industry that we can use," McGee said. The resources include KSU Paul G. Blazer Library, University of Louisville, Keeneland Library, University of

Kentucky, and Fayette County Clerk's Office.)

Local Records Program Grants FY 2022 (Cycle 2)

The Local Records Program Grants FY 2022 Cycle 2 opens on July 6, 2021. The grants help to preserve, protect, and make available records with continuing archival value and assist local agencies with records management through direct services, training, and grant support. Funds are awarded twice annually, and **any local government agency is eligible to apply**.

Funds are made available through fees enacted by the Kentucky General Assembly to preserve and retain local public records. Any local government agency may apply for this grant.

With four regional administrators working with local officials, KDLA ensures professional archival and records management assistance in county and city offices, school districts and health departments. Local Records Grant funds have supported work in microfilming, preservation, equipment, automated indexing, digital imaging systems and codification of ordinances.
