From the Chair

The Kentucky Council on Archives will hold April's Meeting in Cumberland at Southeast Community College. Southeast is home to the Edsel T. Godbey Appalachian Center. Part of the mission of the Center is "to serve as a resource for the region's history and cultural traditions" (http://www.secc. kctcs.net/AppalachianCenter/).

Appropriately, then, the theme of KCA's April Meeting will be Appalachian history.

Several speakers will address a variety of topics: Ernest Tucker of Ashland Community College will speak on folk medicine in Eastern Kentucky; of Dr. James Greene Harlan Independent Schools will discuss Katherine Petit, founder of the Hindman and Pine Mountain settlement schools. These talks will be in the morning and will be held at the Appalachian Center. Lunch will be served at the Benham Schoolhouse Inn (http://www.king domcome.org/inn/), located only three miles from the Southeast campus. (Transportation will be provided if necessary.)

After lunch, and also at the Benham Schoolhouse Inn, Elizabeth Barret of Appalshop (http://www.appalshop.org/) will discuss William R. "Pictureman" Mullins, documenter of Appalachian life through photographs. After this presentation, everyone is invited to visit the Kentucky Coal Mining Museum located a short walk from the Inn. Please see the enclosed agenda for times.

There will be other business at the meeting. Tom Rosko of the University of Kentucky had been serving as KCA's Vice Chair and was supposed to have

become Chair at this meeting. However, Tom has taken a position as Head of Institute Archives and Special Collections at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and will have moved on by April's meeting. Current Board member Bill Kostlevy of Asbury Theological Seminary has volunteered to serve as Chair for the upcoming year. We shall also present a slate of officers for the upcoming term.

Last year marked the celebration of Kentucky's first Archives Week; KCA's October meeting served as its leadoff event. The Archives Week Coordinating Committee met on Tuesday, March 4, 2003 to begin planning this year's event. This year's Archives Week is tentatively scheduled for October 5-11, 2003. KCA members should be considering events their institutions could hold in October to promote the importance of archives and archivists in Kentucky.

I look forward to seeing you in Cumberland on April 25th for what will be an informative and exciting meeting.
